two dogs (adjective-noun)



## TASL Level 2

(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

Let's go for a walk. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Where is the dog? (interrogative)  
(the dog's name) is in the bed. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) needs a leash. (subject-verb-object)  
Put the leash on (the dog's name). (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
Mommy has a coat. (subject-verb-object)  
Where is my coat? (interrogative)  
I put on my coat. (subject-verb-object)  
Walk on the sidewalk. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Leaves are on the ground. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Can we run? (interrogative)  
We are running. (subject-verb)  
(the dog's name) is going potty. (subject-verb-object)  
(the dog's name) sees birds. (subject-verb-object)  
Birds are in the tree. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) barks. (subject-verb)  
Let's go home. (subject-verb-object)  
I will feed the dog. (subject-verb-object)  
Put food in the bowl. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) is happy! (subject-verb-adjective)

## TASL Level 3

(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words)

Should we take (the dog's name) for a walk? (interrogative)  
Daddy said, "Let's go for a walk." (direct discourse)  
It's cold so we need jackets. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
My jacket is in the closet. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Will you get my jacket for me? (interrogative)  
Mommy will get the long leash. (subject-verb-object)  
Daddy put the leash on (the dog's name). (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) is happy because we're going outside. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
We should walk on the sidewalk. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
There are cars on the street. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
I see red and yellow leaves. (subject-verb-object)  
The leaves are on the ground. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) is walking next to me. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) needs to potty in the grass. (one clause + an infinitive)  
(the dog's name) sees a bird in the tree. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
(the dog's name) is barking at the bird. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I want to run with dog. (one clause + an infinitive)  
Daddy said, "We can run slowly." (direct discourse)  
It is time to go home. (one clause + an infinitive)  
I will feed (the dog's name) a treat. (subject-verb-object)



## TASL Level 4

(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing 2 verb forms)

- We need to take the dog for a walk. (one clause + an infinitive)  
It is sunny outside but it's also cold. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Mom said, "We should put on our jackets." (direct discourse)  
I need Mom to get my jacket for me. (one clause + an infinitive)  
Dad said to get the leash off the hook. (indirect discourse)  
Which leash do you want me to get? (interrogative)  
I will pick that leash that is longer. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Put on the leash before we go outside. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
We are going to walk on the sidewalk. (one clause + an infinitive)  
Who will hold the leash while we walk? (interrogative)  
Mom told me that she will hold the leash. (indirect discourse)  
If we are careful, we can run with (the dog's name) . (two clauses + a conjunction)  
We stopped so (the dog's name) can potty in the grass. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Dad cleaned up after (the dog's name) finished going potty. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
The leaves are on the ground because it's Fall. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
(the dog's name) is barking because he sees a squirrel. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Mom has to hold on to the leash tightly. (one clause + an infinitive)  
I see another dog that is going for a walk. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
(the dog's name) wagged his tail when he saw the dog. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Mom said, "It is starting to get dark." (direct discourse)  
We should go home before it gets dark. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
I'll get (the dog's name) a treat when we get home. (two clauses + a conjunction)

## TASL Level 5

(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

When we get home, let's walk the dog and get some exercise. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

The dog needs to go for a walk and go potty. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Should I wear a jacket while we walk the dog? (interrogative)

It's cold because it's Fall, so I need a jacket. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Dad said, "Get the leash and attach it to the collar." (direct discourse)

Dad got bags to clean up when the dog goes potty. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Mom told the dog to sit while she puts on the leash. (indirect discourse)

(the dog's name) is jumping and wagging his tail because he's excited.

(three clauses + two conjunctions)

We are ready to go outside and go for a walk. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Dad said he will hold the leash since our dog is fast. (indirect discourse)

The leaves are changing colors and falling because it's fall. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

We need to stop walking so (the dog's name) can go potty. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

He saw a squirrel that was on the sidewalk and chased it. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Chasing squirrels is (the dog's name) favorite thing to do while we walk.

(two clauses + a secondary verb)

Daddy has to hold on tight, so (the dog's name) doesn't run away. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Mom said, "Look at the pumpkins that people bought for Halloween." (direct discourse)


Can we buy some pumpkins to put on our porch? (interrogative)

Mom said we can go to the store to buy pumpkins (indirect discourse)

When we saw another dog, our dog barked because he was happy. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

After we get inside, I will get a treat to give (the dog's name). (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Let's go home before it gets dark and we can't see. (three clauses + two conjunctions)
