This will **(be)** my feet rest. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

Can you paint my hand today? (Level 3; interrogative)

The yellow paint match**(es)** that. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

Nanny have one of those bags. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

She has a big, blue bow. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

Can I play with these after? (Level 3; interrogative)

I don't have my umbrella with me. (Level 3; subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Can I have a chocolate chip**(s)** at the **really** end? (Level 3; interrogative)

I'm trying to help you. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

Katie have a blue striped shirt. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

(Can you) Do that one more time? (~~Level 3; interrogative~~ with omission of question form)

I need to fix the hand. (Level 3; one clause + an infinitive)

I'm trying to find another button. (Level 3; one clause + an infinitive)

I **needa** fix my shoe. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

Then I put on my seatbelt. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

They are going down the steps. (Level 3; subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

Mommy can't buy green slime. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

I **see** that while I **(was)** eating. (Level 3; two clauses + a conjunction)

I don't want those germs on me. (Level 3; subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Try to throw it to me. (Level 3; subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Do you have the flower in your hair? (Level 3; interrogative)

Tomorrow I will bring Optimus. (Level 2; subject-verb-object)

Grandma said, "I'm happy to see you!" (Level 3; direct discourse)

I **(am)** trying to clean the table. (Level 3; one clause + an infinitive)

What do you want to do? (Level 3; interrogative)

I'm trying **(to)** play the guitar. (~~Level 3; one clause + an infinitive~~ with omission of infinitive)

Can I have more animal crackers? (Level 3; interrogative)

I just saw paint on your hand. (Level 3; subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Do you see my beautiful colors? (Level 3; interrogative)

I **(am)** going to eat the sugar **all gone**. (Level 3; one clause + an infinitive)

I will put the marker back. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

What are we going to pick? (Level 3; interrogative)

My mask is in my cubby. (Level 3; subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I will eat a banana and pretzels. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

He (is) sticking his head under the table. (Level 3; subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I will go swimming after school. (Level 3; subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I need (to) take that home today. (Level 3; ~~one clause + an infinitive~~ with omission of to)

His belly is not feeling good (well). (Level 3; subject-verb-adverb)

Can I take that home? (Level 2; interrogative)

We can make our hat first then we can take a nap.

We can make our hat first. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

Then we can take a nap. (Level 3; subject-verb-object)

Are you playing hide and seek too? (Level 2; interrogative)

I will play with my robot for little bit. (Level 3; subject-verb-prepositional phrase)
