(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

Can I decorate a box? (interrogative) Where are the boxes? (interrogative) I want the big box. (subject-verb-object) Toys were in the box. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) The box is empty. (subject-verb-adjective) Where are the markers? (interrogative) They are in the drawer. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) What color do you want? (interrogative) Mom wants the blue marker. (subject-verb-object) I am coloring the box. (subject-verb-object) Marker is on the box! (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) Draw stars on the box. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase) Can I sit in it? (interrogative) I sit in the box. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) I will draw a circle. (subject-verb-object) I made four circles. (subject-verb-object) Dad is coloring the box. (subject-verb-object) I am coloring the star. (subject-verb-object) My box is pretty! (subject-verb-adjective) It's time to clean up. (subject-verb-object)



(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words) I can play with the box. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) Can I have the big box? (interrogative) Mom said, "You can have it." (direct discourse) I want to make a car. (one clause + an infinitive) Should we use paint or markers? (interrogative) Use markers because we're out of paint. (two clauses + a conjunction) The markers are in the drawer. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) I am opening the box of markers. (subject-verb-object) I want to draw the wheels first. (one clause + an infinitive) How many wheels should I make? (interrogative) Dad said, "You need four wheels." (direct discourse) I made wheels and Dad drew windows. (two clauses + a conjunction) Use a paper plate for the steering wheel. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase) I am sitting in my car! (subject-verb-prepositional phrase) Can we decorate one more box? (interrogative) Mom has another box in the garage. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase) This box is smaller than that box. (subject-verb-object) I'll draw my family on this box. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase) I'm making happy faces on this side. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase) Dad said, "It's time for lunch." (direct discourse) We need to pick up the markers. (one clause + an infinitive)



(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing 2 verb forms)

I asked if I could play with the box. (indirect discourse) Mom said, "Yes, you can play with it." (direct discourse) What should we do with this huge box? (interrogative) "Can I make it into a house?" I asked. (indirect discourse) Mom wants to help me make a house. (one clause + an infinitive) We need markers so we can make the house. (two clauses + a conjunction) I am making windows and Mom is making a door. (two clauses + a conjunction) Should we cut out a door with scissors? (interrogative) Dad told me that he liked my idea. (indirect discourse) Mom is going to cut the door and windows. (one clause + an infinitive) I am watching you while you cut the box. (two clauses + a conjunction) Can I open the door and go inside? (interrogative) Dad's trying to go inside but he's too big. (two clauses + a conjunction) I am inside the house, but you are outside. (two clauses + a conjunction) I need to get the crayons from the drawer. (one clause + an infinitive) Mom asked me why I need the crayons. (indirect discourse) I need them so I can color the house. (two clauses + a conjunction) Close the top so I can have a roof. (two clauses + a conjunction) Can I make a car with another box? (interrogative) Mom said, "I'll look for a box after lunch." (direct discourse) I need to clean up the markers and crayons. (one clause + an infinitive)



(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

What can we do since it's too cold to play outside? (interrogative) Mom said, "You can have that empty box and decorate it." (direct discourse) I am not sure how I want to decorate it. (two clause + a secondary verb) Dad told me I could make a house or turn it into a castle. (indirect discourse) I think I am going to make it into a house. (two clauses + secondary verb) Before I start coloring, I'll see if we have any markers. (three clauses + two conjunctions) I want to cut out windows instead of drawing them. (two clauses + a secondary verb)? Cutting cardboard is hard, so Dad said he'll cut it for me. (indirect discourse) I need to draw rectangles on top, so they look like shingles. (two clauses + a secondary verb) Would you like it if I put a blanket inside the house? (interrogative) Mom said, "That will make your house feel so cozy!" (direct discourse) Dad told me I should find a smaller box and make a car. (indirect discourse) Do we have any smaller boxes sitting in the garage? (interrogative) Mom checked but didn't see any, so she looked in the basement. (three clauses + two conjunctions) She found two boxes and asked me which one I wanted. (indirect discourse) I chose the large one so I could sit and stretch my legs. (three clauses + two conjunctions) Can I have four paper plates to make the wheels? (interrogative) What do you think I should use for the steering wheel? (interrogative) Dad said we have one more paper plate that I can use. (indirect discourse) After I make the steering wheel, I'll attach it and drive the car. (three clauses + two conjunctions) I said, "I am going to park my car next to my house." (direct discourse)
