(single words and word combinations)

green lights (adjective-noun)

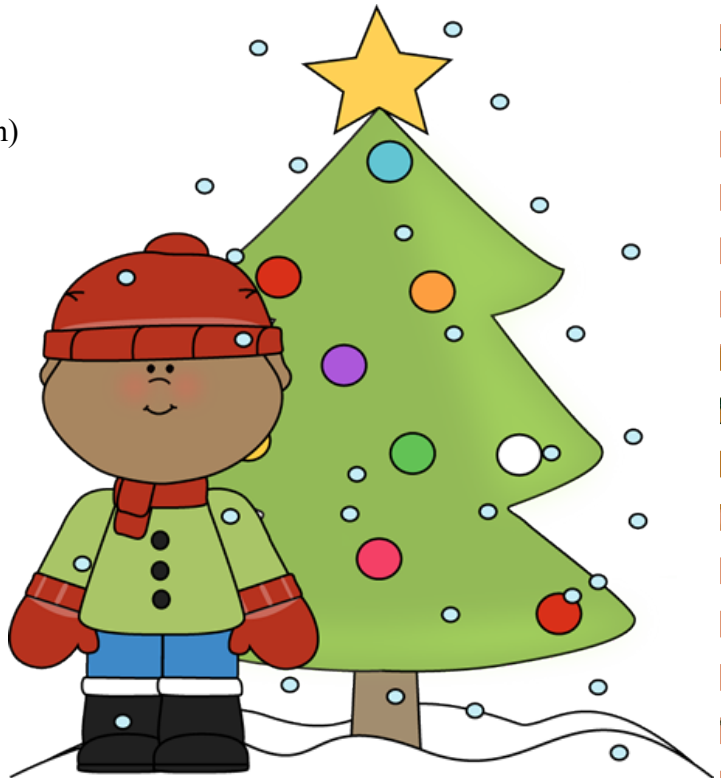
big lights (adjective-noun)

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## TASL Level 2

(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

Where are the Christmas lights? (interrogative)  
Let's ride in the car. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I want hot chocolate. (subject-verb-object)  
Pour it in the cup. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
Who will drive the car? (interrogative)  
Daddy will drive the car. (subject-verb-object)  
I see the lights! (subject-verb-object)  
Lights are on the house. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I see red lights. (subject-verb-object)  
I like the green lights. (subject-verb-object)  
A train is in grass. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
It is a big train. (subject-verb-object)  
Who is on the train? (interrogative)  
Kids are on the train. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I see a big tree. (subject-verb-object)  
Drive the car. (subject-verb-object)  
The tree has white lights. (subject-verb-object)  
Santa is on the house. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Presents are in the bag. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I see a red bow. (subject-verb-object)  
It is on the door. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Let's go home. (subject-verb-object)



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### TASL Level 3

(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words)

I want to see Christmas lights. (one clause + an infinitive)  
You drive and I'll look for lights. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
Dad, will you drive the car? (interrogative)  
Dad said, "I will drive the car." (direct discourse)  
I see lights on the house! (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
Some are green and some are red. (two clauses + a conjunction)  
A big train is in the grass. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Who is riding on the train? (interrogative)  
Kids are riding on the train. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I see blue lights in the tree. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
Do you see the yellow star? (interrogative)  
Mom said, "I see a red bow." (direct discourse)  
Where do you see a red bow? (interrogative)  
The red bow is on the door. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
Our door doesn't have a red bow. (subject-verb-object)  
I see Santa on the roof. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)  
Santa is sitting in a sleigh. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
He has a bag of presents. (subject-verb-object)  
The presents are behind his seat. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)  
I want to drink some hot chocolate. (one clause + an infinitive)  
Can we hang up lights too? (interrogative)



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## TASL Level 4

(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing

When will we go see the Christmas lights? (interrogative)

We can go now since it is dark. (two clauses + a conjunction)

We will ride in the car because it is cold. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I want to bring hot chocolate in the car. (one clause + an infinitive)

Dad said he will drive the car slowly. (indirect discourse)

Mom likes the lights, but I like the snowmen. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Mom said, "The houses are decorated for Christmas." (direct discourse)

I see more lights so let's turn here. (two clauses + a conjunction)

That train looks real, but it is not. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Do you want to go on a train? (interrogative)

I want to go see Santa and his reindeer. (one clause + an infinitive)

I see a Christmas tree, and it is very bright. (two clauses + a conjunction)

How did they get that star up there? (interrogative)

Dad said, "I think they used a ladder." (direct discourse)

They should be careful when they climb the ladder. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Mom said the house with penguins is her favorite. (indirect discourse)

It makes me giggle when the penguins move. (two clauses + a conjunction)

This house is cool because the lights change colors. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Can we listen to music in the car? (interrogative)

We can drive home after the song is over. (two clauses + a conjunction)



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## TASL Level 5

(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

When do we get to see the lights on the houses? (interrogative)

We get to see the lights now since it is dark. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Let's bring hot chocolate to drink while we look at lights. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

We will ride in the car to look at lights because it is cold. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Dad said he will drive slowly so we can see. (indirect discourse)

Mom likes to look at the lights, but I like blowup decorations. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Mom said, "The houses are decorated to celebrate Christmas." (direct discourse)

I see a lot of lights so let's turn here to get a closer look. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I see a train, and it looks real, but it is not. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Dad asked, "Would you like to ride on a train?" (direct discourse)

I would like to ride to the North Pole so I can see Santa. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I want to look at the Christmas tree because it is very bright. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Did they use a ladder to put that star up there? (interrogative)

They should be careful when they climb the ladder, so they don't fall. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

Mom said this house is her favorite because it has penguins. (indirect discourse)

Watching the penguins move made me giggle because they are funny. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

We have to turn on music while we ride in the car. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

What is your favorite Christmas song to listen to during the holidays? (interrogative)

We should go home because it is late and I am tired. (three clauses + two conjunctions)



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
