TASL Level 1 (single words and word combinations)

a bear (noun)

a brown bear (adjective-noun)

the big table (adjective-noun)

a chair (noun)

hide (verb)

Hide the bear. (verb-noun)

Mommy hides. (noun-verb)

I open my eyes. (verb-noun)

Where is the bear? (interrogative)

The bear falls down. (noun-verb)

The bear is under the table. (noun-noun)

Daddy hides. (noun-verb)

Where is the bear? (interrogative)

Push the chair. (verb-noun)

The bear is on the chair. (noun-noun)

my turn (expression)

Mommy runs. (noun-verb)

Hide the bear. (verb-noun)

All done! (expression)

Open your eyes. (verb-noun)



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TASL Level 2
(simple sentences of at least 3 words)

I will play hide and seek. (subject-verb-object)
What will you hide? (interrogative)
You should hide the bear. (subject-verb-object)
The bear is brown. (subject-verb-adjective)
Give the bear to Mommy. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)
I close my eyes. (subject-verb-object)
Mommy hides the bear. (subject-verb-object)
I should open my eyes. (subject-verb-object)
Where is the bear? (interrogative)
It's not under the table. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)
I looked in the box. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)
It is behind the chair. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)
Daddy found the bear. (subject-verb-object)
Can I hide the bear? (interrogative)
Who will count? (interrogative)
Put it next to the window. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)
Mommy opened her eyes. (subject-verb-object)
Mommy looked for the bear. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)
She found the bear. (subject-verb-object)
It was under the chair. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)



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TASL Level 3 **(simple and complex sentences of at least 6 words)**

I will play hide and seek with Daddy. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

What do you want to hide? (interrogative)

We can hide the bear or dog. (subject-verb-object)

Mom wants to hide the brown bear. (one clause + an infinitive)

Close your eyes and count to ten. (two clauses + a conjunction)

Mom will hide the brown bear. (subject-verb-object)

Mom said, "You can open your eyes." (direct discourse)

Where did you hide the bear? (interrogative)

The bear is not under the table. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

I will look in the box. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

The bear is hiding behind the chair. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)

Daddy found the bear behind the chair. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Is it my turn to hide something? (interrogative)

I want to hide the bear. (one clause + an infinitive)

Close your eyes and I'll hide it. (two clauses + a conjunction)

The bear is not under the couch. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

I said, "Mommy, open your eyes." (direct discourse)

Mommy is looking for the bear. (subject-verb-object-prepositional phrase)

Mommy looked and she found the bear. (two clauses + a conjunction)

The bear was hiding under the chair. (subject-verb-prepositional phrase)



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TASL Level 4

(complex sentences of at least 8 words containing 2 verb forms)

I would like to play hide and seek with Dad. (one clause + an infinitive)

Which animal would you like to hide first? (interrogative)

We should ask Mom if she can play. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I want to hide the bear on my turn. (one clause + an infinitive)

Dad closes his eyes and he counts to twenty. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I will hide the bear while you count. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I said, "I am finished hiding the bear." (direct discourse)

Where do you think the bear is hiding? (interrogative)

I looked but the bear was not under the table. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I will open the box to look inside. (one clause + an infinitive)

Did you find the bear hiding behind the chair? (interrogative)

I said that Dad found the brown bear. (indirect discourse)

Is it Mom's turn to hide the bear? (interrogative)

You should close your eyes while Mom hides it. (two clauses + a conjunction)

We are waiting for Mom to hid the bear. (one clause + an infinitive)

I said that Dad should open his eyes. (indirect discourse)

We looked in the kitchen but couldn't find it. (two clauses + a conjunction)

I want to find the bear by myself. (one clause + an infinitive)

Dad said, "The bear is under the chair." (direct discourse)



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TASL Level 5

(very complex sentences of at least 10 words containing 3 verb forms)

I would like to use a bear when we play hide-n-seek. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Which animal will you hide when it is your turn? (interrogative)

Mom will hide the dog, but I want the bear because it's my favorite. (two clauses + two conjunctions)

I would like to hide the brown bear when it's my turn. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Dad should close his eyes and count while I hide the bear. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

I will find a good place to hide the bear while you count. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I said, "You can open your eyes because I hid the bear." (direct discourse)

Did you hide the bear in the kitchen because I can't find it? (interrogative)

I looked but I didn't see the bear hiding under the table. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

I would like to open the box and look inside. (two clauses + a secondary verb)

Did you find the bear, or do you need more time to look? (interrogative)

I said that Dad found the bear hiding next to the chair. (indirect discourse)

Is it Dad's turn to hide the bear or can I go? (interrogative)

Dad said, "You should close your eyes so I can hide the bear." (direct discourse)

She will see it if you put it there so pick a different spot. (three clauses + two conjunctions)

I said that Mom should open her eyes and look for the bear. (indirect discourse)

Mom said, "I looked for the bear in the bathroom but couldn't find it." (direct discourse)

If you can't find it, I will give you a hint to help you. (two clauses + a secondary verb)



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
